

Report on the results from Governor Monitoring Questionnaires - November 2021

As part of their role, School Governors are required to monitor various aspects of school life. The aim of these questionnaires was to elicit the views of parents / carers on school life, the school environment and the schools response to the Covid-19 pandemic.

On 12th October 2021, three separate Questionnaires were sent out to parents / carers via the online Survey Monkey website. Three separate questionnaires were produced to enable the free version of Survey Monkey to be used. The free method does have limitations, and a maximum of 20 responses can be analysed for each questionnaire

The results were analysed on 4th November 2021, and only contains the responses to that date.

Overview of results

On the whole parents and carers are happy with the School, and the way it is run. Children seem happy, and do not seem to have been overly affected by the pandemic, in their parent or carers view.

Common themes from the written responses include:

- Communication could be better, and with more notice provided for change in dates / events.
- How happy parents are and how well the school handled the Covid-19 pandemic and the challenges this brought to teaching and home learning.

More than 50% of the respondents children attended school during lockdown. Most felt this was a huge benefit to not only the children but the parents / carers also.

There were mixed responses to home learning, dependent on personal circumstances including work and other children to look after etc. This is to be expected and it is known that some children are more responsive to home learning than others, with some children engaging really well, and



others not at all. Generally the work packs provided were well received and most children engaged for at least part of the home learning.

Questionnaire 1

Total respondents - 20.

These questions mirror those previously used which are in line with Ofsted questions. Overall children and parents / carers are happy with the school and the way it is run, feeling children make good progress and the quality of teaching is high. There was a mixed response on the question surrounding appropriateness of homework. This is explored further in the other questionnaires.

Questionnaire 2

Total respondents - 21 (only the first 20 could be analysed due to the limitations of SurveyMonkey).

Overall, parents feel the information received from the school regarding progress was positive with 100% of respondents agreeing or strongly agreeing. All respondents would recommend our school to other parents / carers, and feel their child's emotional and spiritual needs are met. Parents / carers feel the school promotes healthy lifestyles , feel their child is offered interesting and enjoyable topics and activities. Parents / carers are comfortable about approaching the school with any concerns. Over three quarters of the respondents are happy with school meal provisions, feeling their child enjoys what is offered, and eats well. 10% disagreed, that their child does not enjoy school meals.

There were some really positive comments when asked what parents / carers liked most about the school. Comments include:

"The community feel. It is like one big family. I feel happy sending my child here"

"ethos, atmosphere and caring. vertical mixing between children. sense of children being fully valued members of the community. Links to St Helen's Church. Excellent teaching staff."

"The caring and uniquely 'country' environment the children learn in. The outside has always been incorporated into the classroom (even before Covid) and the children learn to genuinely care for each other and the staff."

"Every child matters and is known well by all staff. You are at the heart of our community"



When asked if there was anything parents / carers would change the following was said:

"I don't think homework is necessary at this stage."

"The use of Facebook is great for those who use it. However some don't and therefore some notices / notice of events which is advertised via Facebook can be missed. Perhaps mass email would work better"

"I feel we could get more notice for some date changes and more warning (more than a few days) of things happening"

"General Communication can sometimes be a bit lapse about things going on or changesG"

Questionnaire 3

Total respondents - 17

Over half pupils attended school in some capacity during the Covid pandemic. Generally this seemed to benefit children, maintaining some sort of routine during a highly disruptive period.

Parents / carers found this difficult and were thankful for the support from school. Packs and teaching were generally well received although pupils did not engage well in some cases. There seem to be no ongoing issues identified by parents / carers following the period of upheaval, perhaps some social issues immediately following the disruption.

Many respondents have mentioned they would appreciate better notice of events happening, and the use of social media, although very helpful, not all parents / carers use facebook so sometimes things get missed.

Other things mentioned; included:

- Positive feedback Tapestry.
- Very positive feedback on the school and teachers as a whole, and the support offered generally, but specifically during the pandemic
- Class 1 not having a full time teacher
- Early years having 3 teachers within a 12 month period.

Conclusion and Next Steps

The questionnaire was generally well received with a positive number of responses. Children, and parents / carers are happy with the school generally, and how the school managed teaching and home learning during the Covid-19 pandemic. They value our school and the atmosphere created. Children along with parents / carers feel safe at school and that their needs are met. The responses from this series of questionnaires was positive and there are a few points which can be discussed further.

Next steps and how to respond to the results will be discussed at the Governing Body interim meeting on Tuesday 7th December 2021, 7pm. The report will be updated accordingly.
